Wildlife Watching

There are many native trees in the glen include Hazel, Rowan, Oak, Ash and Willow. On the moorland in springtime, you can hear the songs of Cuckoo and Skylark. Keep your eyes to the skies and watch out for a passing bird of prey such as Buzzards, Kestrels, or Ospreys.

In summer and autumn, dragonflies patrol the skies above the Greenock and Kelly Cuts can be seen darting around chasing down prey, when the weather conditions are just right the section of path along the Greenock cut is alive with butterflies!

Shielhill Glen SSSI Nature Trail

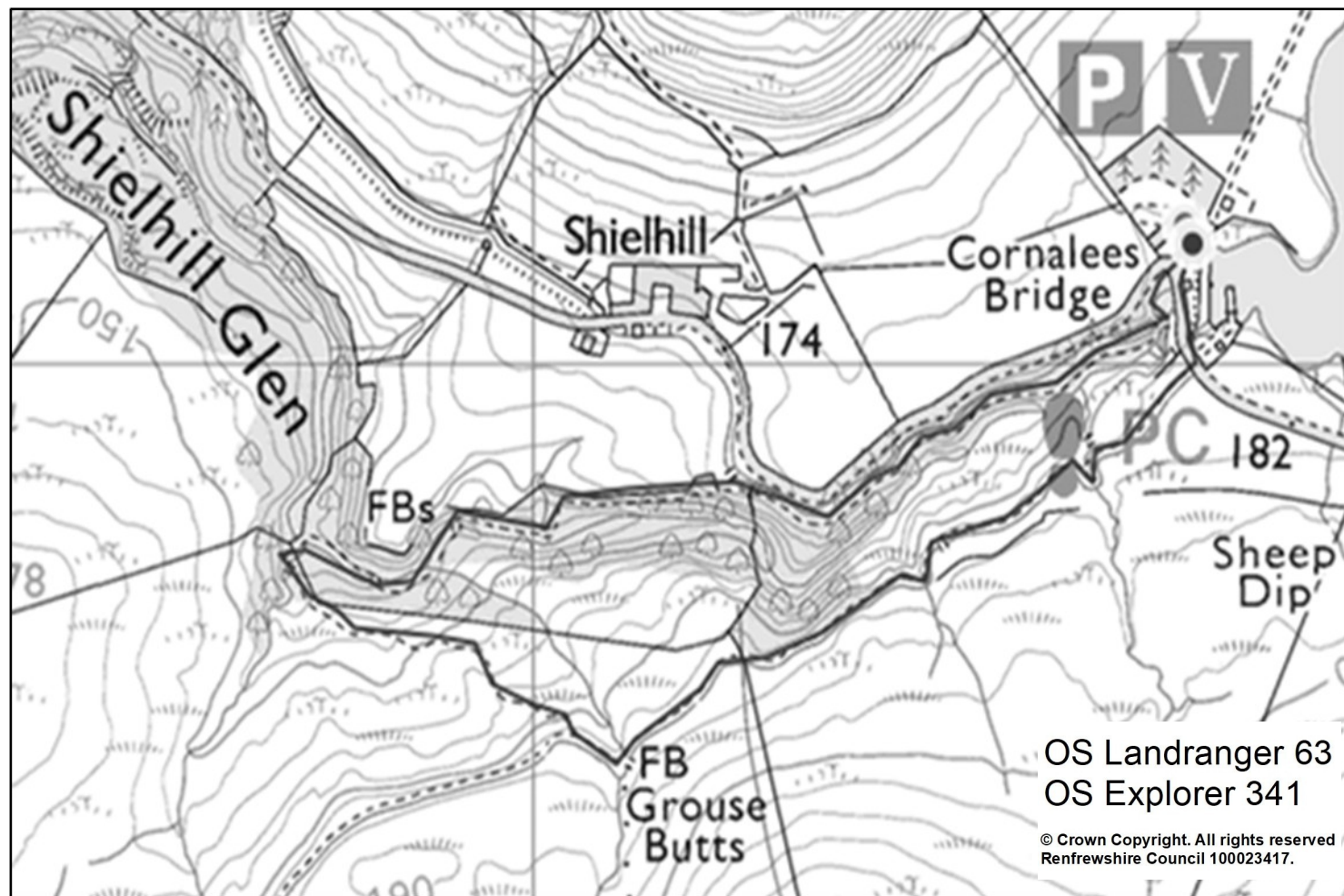
A lovely circular walk that offers a chance to walk part of the Kelly cut and Greenock Cut and to walk through our semi ancient broad leaf woodland. It is a haven for many birds and animals. You can't help but notice all of the lichens and mosses which are a great indicator of good air quality.

On whin dusted trail, board walk and gravel path. Kelly Cut section muddy in wet weather 228 wooden steps and 5 gates.		2.5km / 1.5 mile Allow 45 to 60 mins
Way marked black disc white arrow.		

Shielhill Glen

The wood in the Glen is a semi ancient woodland and has been designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). It is filled with Birch, Oak, Ash and Rowan. Look out for ancient Oak trees, estimated to be 300 – 400 years old! The rich woodland ground flora includes species such as pendulous sedge, opposite-leaved golden saxifrage and great horsetail, and the grass of Parnassus can also be found in many parts of the site.

The route can be walked clock wise or anti clock size and is marked with a black and white marker. We recommend going down the steps from the Kelly Cut if you have younger children as they find going down the steps easier than coming up them!



Wood Spirits of Shielhill Glen

During the winter months our Rangers and volunteers occasionally carve wooden heads to place around the trail.....Can you find all the wood spirits on our Nature Trail?

Ask inside the visitor centre for the “Wood Spirit Hunt” recording sheet and see how many you can find.

Points of Interest.

- Reconstructed sluice at the head of the Greenock Cut.
- At the start of the nature trail where the picnic tables are was once the site of a WWII anti-aircraft spot light position
- The dry stone wall near the board walk by the bottom gate is a popular spot for basking common lizards
- The large oak tree by the Greenock Cut was a runner up in 2017 Scottish tree of the year
